As Ukweli Africa we refuse to accept silence, fear, or burnout as the cost of journalism in Africa. We believe journalism should protect communities, not endanger the people who tell their stories. Yet across Uganda, especially as we move closer to the 2026 elections, journalists are being attacked, intimidated, and silenced.

WHY IT MATTERS

Covering elections in Uganda continues to be one of the most dangerous assignments for reporters.


In one by-election this year, over 30 journalists were assaulted by security forces in Kawempe North. Cameras were smashed, footage deleted, and reporters beaten. Some were hospitalized.

The Uganda Journalists Association has already recorded 36 cases of assault on media practitioners this year alone.

Many journalists are now forced to work in fear, censor themselves, or abandon critical stories altogether.

When journalists are silenced, so are the communities they serve. Election violence weakens accountability and erodes the public's right to know.







WHAT WE'VE BEEN DOING

Despite these challenges, Ukweli Africa continues to build safer, stronger journalism:

The Newsroom Project: We premiered our first episode with veteran journalist Frank Walusimbi, which reached more than 2,000 viewers and sparked a much-needed conversation on mental health in the media.

This is just the beginning, we've already filmed and interviewed more than nine reporters and anchors whose stories we'll be releasing in the coming

months. Our next premiere drops on 5th September 2025, so stay tuned.

Documentary with Media Challenge Initiative: We are finalizing a new documentary exploring newsroom mental health and accountability. After two strong preparation meetings, we are close to sharing it with you.

Training & Advocacy: We attended Chapter Four Uganda's training on evidence-based advocacy for human rights violations.
